

Talking about Languages in Gàidhlig

We had a memorable day today here: a chilly morning with frost on the grass and then a warm, late summer-ish afternoon in t-shirts.

Neònach!

This learning tip is about sounding like a native speaker.

Speaking Gaelic like a native speaker does can be challenging. No one wants to feel amateurish. The unspoken gap between learner and fluent/native speaker can feel huge. Maybe awkward and frustrating too. I know I felt those when I started.

Luckily, we can cross that gap quickly by <u>acquiring full phrases that native</u> speakers use often.

Here are 3 quick ways to sound just like a native speaker when talking about languages:

- * Is toil leam <u>i</u>. = I like <u>it</u>. (*it* meaning a specific language)
- *Tha mi ga h-ionnsachadh. = I'm learning it.
- *Tha mi ag ionnsachadh (na) Gàidhlig. = I'm learning (the) Gaelic.

If i, ga, or na are confusing, just know that <u>languages are all grammatically</u> <u>feminine in Gaelic</u>. Thus, we use those specific words.

Please don't overthink it; just give these phrases some practice. Put them up around the house where you'll see them often or spend a week using them as many times as possible every day. Focussed practice will make these feel more natural. []
