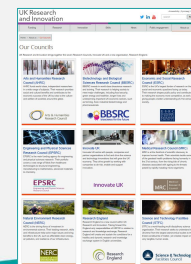
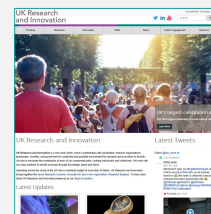

How are they realising these impact factors?

- Continued focus on sustainable R+I environment: ethics, integrity, reproducibility, careers and skills
- More focused, challenge-led and strategic calls e.g. GCRF, ISCF, E3, I3
- More funding calls lead by or including industry
- Focus on collaboration, interdisciplinary for novel solutions, working alongside stakeholders
- Sharing resources, data, infrastructure
- Short call deadlines
- Whole project lifecycle - it's not over until the impact is fully realised, evidenced and reported

What is the range of grants?

- Program grants - Large, multi-year, multi-person, may even build you a building
- Project grants - Big, multi-year, multi-person
- Research grants - Normally one person, - Sometimes multi-year
- Equipment grants - Top-up funding to support existing work
- Travel grants - Help you get networking

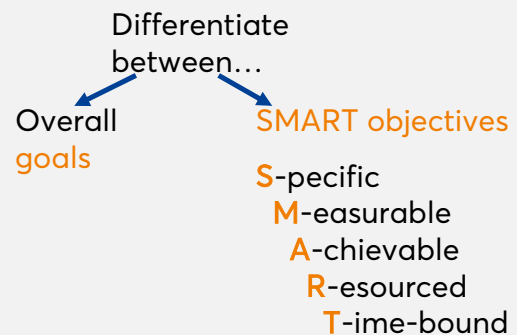
How can you get to know a grant awarding organisation?

 Make sure ask for enough – bidding low looks silly.

T Staff / Team / Institution

- Are internationally renowned staff available to help / advise?
- What constellations of expertise do you have that no one else shares?
- Is there expert or technical support on hand?
- Does your institution have a track record of success in this area?

T Matched or in-kind funding

- Show how their money can go further in your hands
- Have you negotiated free time on a machine?
- Is there expert or technical support that you can call on at no cost?
- Is a company prepared to sponsor some part of the work if you get the core funding?

T Bibliographic track record

It is your job to show just how successful you have been in the past:

- Papers
- Citations of those papers
- Compare with others in the field
- Conference presentations
- Letters to journals
- Etc.

T Dissemination activities

- Papers
- Conference presentations / posters
 - Make this a deliverable that needs funds
- Seminars / Workshops / conferences
- Website - Podcast

T Letters of support

- You may need to draft them
 - But the named person needs to sign them
- Make sure it refers exactly to this project, and address the letter to the review panel for this application. Don't make it look generic.

The importance of a plain English summary


A plain English summary is a clear explanation of your research. Many reviewers use this summary to inform their review of your funding application. They include clinicians and researchers who do not have specialist knowledge of your field as well as members of the public. If your application for funding is successful, the summary will be used on National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) and other websites.
